
## Forage Production Issues

Last year was a tough one for many forage producers in the county. Depending on your location, you may have been short on rainfall. Fall armyworm wreaked havoc and damaged many bromegrass stands. Hay prices were generally low, which made input costs in fertilizer, insecticide, herbicide, fuel, etc. challenging to pay for, particularly if you don't own livestock.

These circumstances and more will be discussed at a forage producer meeting scheduled for Wednesday, February 18, 2026, beginning at 6 pm in the Sunflower Meeting Room at 612 E. Campbell, Westmoreland.

Dr. Tina Sullivan, Northeast Area K-State Extension Agronomist, will be explaining fall armyworm, why they're so bad, and the potential management practices that can be done to attempt to mitigate damage. I will be covering forage soil fertility, including a look at the nitrogen price and hay price relationship and minimal fertilizer applications to increase survival in tough conditions. Both presenters will be happy to address other forage-related questions.

### Farm Bill Program Decision Deadline


Producers will have at least a little more time to make their Farm Bill program decisions (ARC-Co vs. PLC) than mid-March due to heavy workloads for FSA. I will be happy to discuss the choice for each of your farm numbers and commodities as further details are released. This delay does not harm producers as more information about predicted prices is beneficial in the decision-making process. Watch for communication from FSA and/or myself concerning this deadline.

### Uncrewed Aerial Systems (Drones) Workshop



I mentioned back in November a precision agriculture and/or UAS (drones) workshop being planned for early this year. To better facilitate live demonstrations, that workshop has been postponed until after daylight savings time. It will most likely be held on Wednesday, March 25, 2026, starting late afternoon in the St. Marys or Wamego vicinity. Please be on the lookout soon for finalized details.

### Cow Herd Management for February

#### Cow Herd

Target BCS at calving for spring-calving cows:

- 5 for mature cows
- 6 for young females

Be ready to start your post-calving nutrition program for spring-calving cows.

Evaluate fall-calving cows for BCS:

- Adjust nutrition program as needed relative to weaning date

If conditions allow, keep grazing crop residues and dormant pastures but be prepared to move cattle or provide supplemental feed.

Increase energy content 1% for every degree F below the lower critical temperature (LCT) when dry, 2% if they have a wet hair coat.

Put down bedding, remove snow, ensure cattle have access to wind protection.

Supply adequate water volume and space in freezing conditions.

Don't forget about your herd bulls!

- Bulls need to be in a BCS  $\geq 5.0$  prior to the next season of use
- Keep young and mature bulls separate if possible and provide plenty of space to prevent injury
- Spread sufficient fresh bedding to help avoid testicular frostbite

#### Calf Management

Do you have a plan for weaning and marketing fall-born calves?

- Evaluate your feed resources and cost of gain relative to the value of gain
- Talk to prospective buyers in advance of selling

Evaluate calf health protocols, both spring- and fall-born calves.

Monitor growth and pubertal development of replacement heifers.

#### General Management

For spring-calving herds this calving season:

- How are you going to record your calving data?
- What information are you going to record?

Take inventory of supplies and clean equipment prior to spring calving.

If making bull selection decisions:

- Review your herd performance relative to your marketing and genetic goals.
- Study EPDs impacting your marketing and genetic goals and do your homework well before sale day
