Ag Profitability Conference: December 9th at Pottorf Hall



Many of our farmers across the US are experiencing one of the most challenging periods in our US agricultural economy in recent history. With low crop prices, elevated input costs, and slim margins, it can be a difficult time in agriculture.

Our K-State Ag Economists share that in 2021, only about 4.4% of Kansas farmers had a negative net farm income. But in 2024, that number jumped to 28.5%. That is a staggering statistic.

It's been a roller coaster for agriculture-related headlines in recent weeks, from tariffs, the China soybean deal, and the USDA's new plan to "fortify the American beef industry". How does all this agriculture government policy affect our Kansas farmers and ranchers?

Area Extension offices, including Pottawatomie County, are teaming up with K-State's Department of Agricultural Economics to address the current financial pressure and uncertainty and shed some light on current agricultural policy.

All are invited to join us at our upcoming event, Making "Cents" of a Shifting Ag Economy. The conference will focus on preparing producers to navigate economic downturns, manage input costs, and help them think through what they

can do now to position themselves for when profitability improves.

Topics for the day include presentations on:

- Crop Profitability
- Agriculture policy
- Farm bill changes
- Land values
- Farm transition



Using Uncrewed Aerial Systems (Drones) on your Farm or Ranch



There continues to be increased interest in using UAS in production agriculture. The first step is to earn a commercial remote pilot license, part 107, from the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA). Unlike pesticide applicators, UAS pilots must get their commercial license even to use a

UAS on their own farm or ranch. If the UAS will help you make or save money (which is the case for anything more than a toy/recreational use) you need a commercial pilot license.

One effective way to obtain your commercial remote pilot license, part 107, is to attend a ground school. Kansas State University at Salina does offer a 3-day class followed by the FAA written test on the 4th day. I participated in this short course in 2018 and do recommend it. The link below provides more information. The next class is January 12 - 14, 2026 with the test date of January 15.

Livestock and Forage “Alphabet Soup” Workshop: LRP, PRF, AF, and RAP January 21, 2026, in Onaga

LRP – Livestock Risk Protection Insurance

PRF – Pasture Rangeland Forage Insurance

AF – Annual Forage Insurance

RAP – Rangeland Analysis Platform

Plans are underway for a livestock and forage workshop to be held at Onaga High School on the evening of Wednesday, January 21, 2026. Topics will include livestock and forage risk management tools by Jenny Ifft, Kansas State University Agricultural Policy Specialist, and a hands-on activity using the Rangeland Analysis Platform, led by Shannon Blocker, Pottawatomie County Extension Agent, Agriculture and Natural Resources. Producers should plan to bring a laptop if they have one, but a limited number of Kansas State University Agricultural Economics computers will be available for use at this workshop. Registration will start in mid-December.

Pasture, Rangeland, and Forage Insurance Deadline Approaching

December 1, 2025, is the sign-up deadline for Pasture, Rangeland, and Forage (PRF) insurance for the 2026 coverage year. PRF crop insurance makes automatic payment (indemnity) for hay or grazing acreage when local rainfall (precipitation) falls below the historic average.

Payments are triggered by rainfall/precipitation in your local area, or USDA-defined grid (approximately 17 by 13 miles). Producers can select different triggers for payments, or

coverage levels. 90% is the maximum and pays whenever rainfall drops below 90% of the historic average. 70% is the minimum. Producers must select at least 2 intervals and at most 6 intervals per year. Intervals are 2 adjacent months, for example June and July. Like other crop insurance, the Federal government pays for part of the crop insurance premium depending on the coverage level selected.
